

This author is extremely talented for her years. Edna is charming, both the character and the environment. The landscape is a romantic vignette for anyone fortunate enough to have known it. I must say that the story is a different one when read with a male perspective. It became a slow lesson of patience in a forgotten world that holds much wisdom. Edna's new world. I think most of us envy anyone who can still hold on to a thread of the 20th century. Edna in the desert touched that thread. That's the land Lederman creates quite well. The solemn and the stern was a whole world supposed to dissappear with the Millennium bug after Y2K. Lederman rediscovers it. Urban children of our age stereotypically refuse to change but Edna is willing to forge a temporary life of change and sparks of courage. Perhaps because she won't be exposed in a world without the internet, a world where mistakes are singular. Not a current world where social media will xerox our faults forever. Lederman knows that we can all find bravery wherever we may be, and takes a adorable approach to the message.

I really enjoyed this book. I like the way the author gave Edna self respect, by having her use some

restraint when it came to Johnny. The book left me with a deeply good feeling, and I would want to read the sequel. I wanted to be angry with the author because she would suddenly switch point of view within one paragraph, which felt awkward, but it did help me to understand what Johnny was feeling when Edna acted the way that she did. The book shows how 13 year old Edna grows in patience and understanding of other people, as she grows in her ability to quietly contemplate the world and not impulsively react to everything. I found Edna to be a most likable character. I was left wanting more.

I live in the area described so it was fun to recognize the various locales, but I knew everything that was going to happen by the end of the first three pages. The story line was ridiculously predictable. It was as bad as one of those Lifetime (& other so-called women's networks) made for TV movies. And the writing was colorless, which given the poetic beauty of the desert where the story is set - was kind-of pitiful. The bad plot might have been bearable if the language was transcendent, but it was just perfunctory.

Great read. Very enjoyable. I am not the most likely reader of a book about a 13 year old girl but a friend insisted I try this because I can't stand this generation of kids glued to their phones (this book is about a kid who has no phone or computer or TV for a summer). Gives me hope! I was surprised at how much I enjoyed it. Solid story, simple, no magic. Like an old classic, ie Little Women or Anne of Green Gables, but modern times. Only thought is it could have been longer, and now I have to go to the desert!

I enjoyed this book. I can't remember if it was a first person narration, but I do remember enjoying the main character's path to self discovery and the roll of the grandparents in her life.

This was a well-written, engaging novel. I was disappointed when I got to the end; and am looking forward to seeing more from this author.
