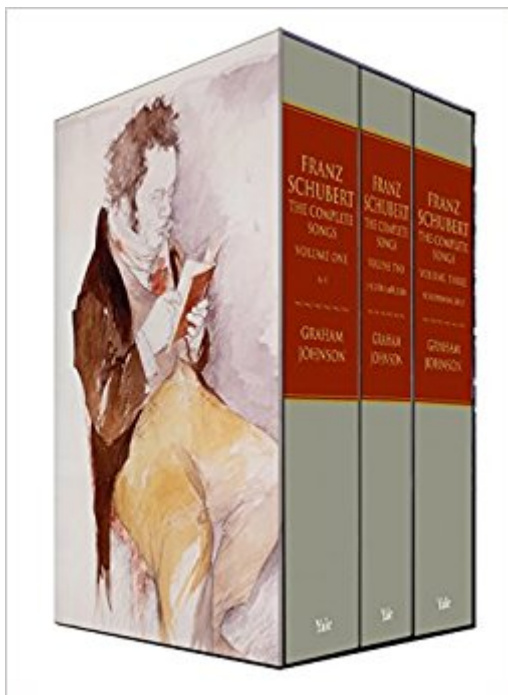


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Franz Schubert: The Complete Songs



Synopsis

This three-volume boxed set is the definitive work on Franz Schubert's vocal music with piano. A richly illustrated encyclopedia, these substantial volumes contain more than seven hundred song commentaries with parallel text and translations (by Richard Wigmore), detailed annotations on the songs' poetic sources, and biographies of one hundred and twenty poets, as well as general articles on accompaniment, tonality, transcriptions, singers, and more. Written by Graham Johnson, celebrated accompanist, author, and the first pianist ever to record all of Schubert's songs and part-songs, this sumptuous work is a must for performers, scholars, and all lovers of Schubert lieder.

Graham Johnson is Senior Professor of Accompaniment at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama in London, and plays for recitals around the world.

This is an extraordinary set of books on the songs of Franz Schubert. While I have not read all of it (!), I have had a month to read the general sections at the beginning of the first volume and end of the third volume, and browse the entries on some of my favorite songs. The first point is that, while the commentary for the 37 Hyperion discs on which Graham Johnson and many fine singers recorded the complete songs was a starting point for these volumes, they go far beyond what is found in the booklets with the discs. Much information has been added about the poets and the contexts for the songs. Much new information is included. Second, the set is organized in a way that makes it easy to find information. ALL of the entries are in alphabetical order (leaving out an initial Der, Die, Das, ...), with the exception that the song cycles are treated as a single group (e.g., Winterreise is one entry under "W", not 24 entries scattered around). Second, the information provided for each song includes a set of standardized facts about it, as well as links to the previous and following entries in the chronological list of Schubert's songs. This includes the Opus, D and H

numbers, key structure, first line of the music, complete texts in German and English, and listings of edition(s), commentaries, and recordings in the Hyperion set and by Fischer-Dieskau with timings. There are entries for each of the poets, for example 15 pages for Goethe, 2 pages for von Bruchmann. These are in the overall alphabetical set-up of the volumes. Third, the writing is consistently clear and engaging (as those who know Mr Johnson's original writing for the discs as issued will recognize). It is a pleasure to look up a song (or just pick one at random) and read what he has to say about it. Finally, this set is an excellent value. It has nearly 3000 pages, and the text fills the pages (margins are less than an inch). Anyone with an interest in Schubert and his songs will find this highly worth having as a companion.

If you checked Gramophone's Hyperion Records adverts every month from 1988 to 2000 waiting for word of the next new CD in Graham Johnson's Complete Schubert Songs, then you've probably been waiting for this long-in-the-making study to be published -- perhaps even calling Yale University Press about it. One expected something along the lines of Johnson's study of French *mÃ©lodie*, that excellent one-volume book also published by Yale. But one little expected this three-volume encyclopedia that appeared today, 16 December. Even a few hours of leafing through it and spot-reading show what a marvel of musicology this is and how worth the wait it has been. Its c. 3000 pages and endless illustrations cover each song and Schubert's lyricists and special topics like Schubert's piano, Schubert's letters and diaries, Ossian, etc., etc. The price is substantial, but it is cheap compared to the hours of pleasure Johnson promises. Our indebtedness to him continues to mount.

Comprehensive (obviously, at 3000 pages), learned, a scholar with, literally, hands-on experience (he is the accompanist on all 40 CDs of the Hyperion Schubert lieder set), Johnson's essays are at the very peak of Schubert learning. There is really nothing comparable to it in English. For singers, players, and serious music lovers, it is essential. One caveat, however: some of the essays are quite technical and assume a knowledge of at least basic music theory. Expensive but worth every penny.

Required reading for owners of the complete Hyperion recordings! The book in the CD box set is great, but this takes it to a new level. The research is stunning and the writing is easy to follow. Wonderful.

This is a work of towering scholarship by one of the great musician scholars of our time. And it is only one aspect of the breadth and depth of his 'Curriculum Vitae' - ; also, it is touching in its devotion and generosity. It gives us glimpses of Graham Johnson as a human being of real stature.
