

As anyone who has served in a leadership role will tell you, leadership is hard work - and even when things go right, it can be challenging. Miles Anthony Smith gives leaders a resource to raise their effectiveness. He calls it Level 5 Leadership and Servant Leadership. While some of the principles are not new, Smith gives them a new fresh look. In four sections, the book explores the choices we make in service, serving your organization, humility (often lacking in today's leaders), and then finally, how these play out in the real world. How you serve is your choice, but remember that people in your organization are watching. This book will help you serve right.

Not knowing what to expect from Miles' first book, I was very happily surprised to find a book on leadership that was not bloated with non-actionable platitudes. Leadership Sucks is actually a meld of leadership and management the author discusses in a straightforward, pragmatic style. The book is filled with good content throughout, not just the first 60 pages. His chapter on Team Culture: Hiring and Coaching People Who Fit is loaded with value and in the controversy over whether leaders can actually create or mold culture, Miles explains not only the "can you?" but also the "how to." Servant leadership is a trendy topic, but in Leadership Sucks, Miles gives some great insights into how to be a true servant when it comes to messy issues like firing employees. A good solid read and study. Quite remarkable for a first book.

I've seen effective leaders and ineffective leaders. Smith has nailed down many qualities of effective leaders, and explains just why it's so hard to be an effective leader, writing in a style I found easy to read. There is some reference to his Christian faith, which I did not find to be overwhelming here. I'd recommend this book to anyone in a leadership position. For those who are not doing well at it, this will point them in the direction to figure out more effective ways to lead. For those who are already good leaders, they will at least find the sympathy the author has for those doing what it takes to lead well.

Miles Anthony captures principles in his book that will transform you and your organization.
