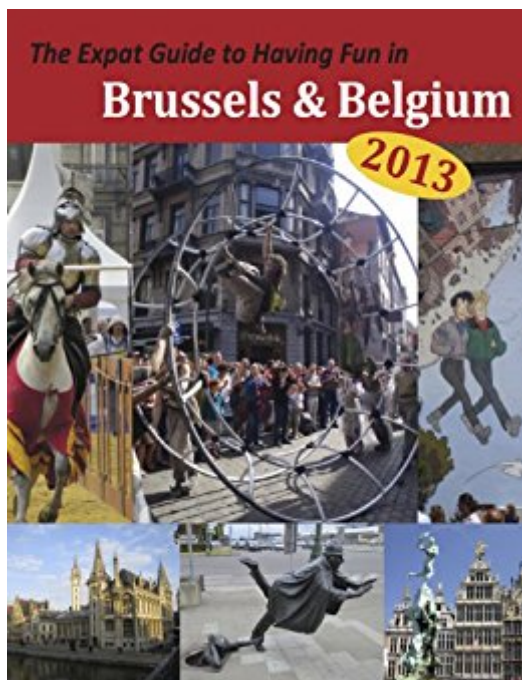


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# The Expat Guide To Having Fun In Brussels & Belgium

During his sojourn in the low countries he traveled far and wide, exploring everything Belgium had to offer, while also venturing forth into the nearby countries to find the best places to visit there as well. The author has explored the pyramids in Egypt, trekked through Alpine peaks in Switzerland and Austria, savored the libertine culture of Denmark, hiked Hadrianâ™s Wall in northern England, unearthed ancient Roman ruins in Israel, climbed the pyramids of Chichen Itza in the Yucatan, roamed the Great Wall in China, sailed the Fjords of Norway, climbed the Eiffel Tower in Paris, and delighted in la dolce vita in Rome. After two years living in Brussels we thought we knew this town inside and out, until we landed on a copy of The Expat Guide to Having Fun in Brussels & Belgium by Mr. Morris. There obviously was a lot of research that went into this guide which is repleted with activities available and interesting places to visit. Some of my favorites usefully presented by month by month fashion were: cycling (especially on car-free Sunday), festivals, historic re-enactements, regattas, markets, tours, brasseries, cafes, creperies, ice cream parlors, museums (especially nocturnal visits), castles, the coast, the mountains, green parks, near and far Belgian and European top destinations, play centers, amusement parks, classes, and more) for young singles to families with kids, this guide is as comprehensive as it gets. They are no better written now than they were when originally published. Save your money.

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
