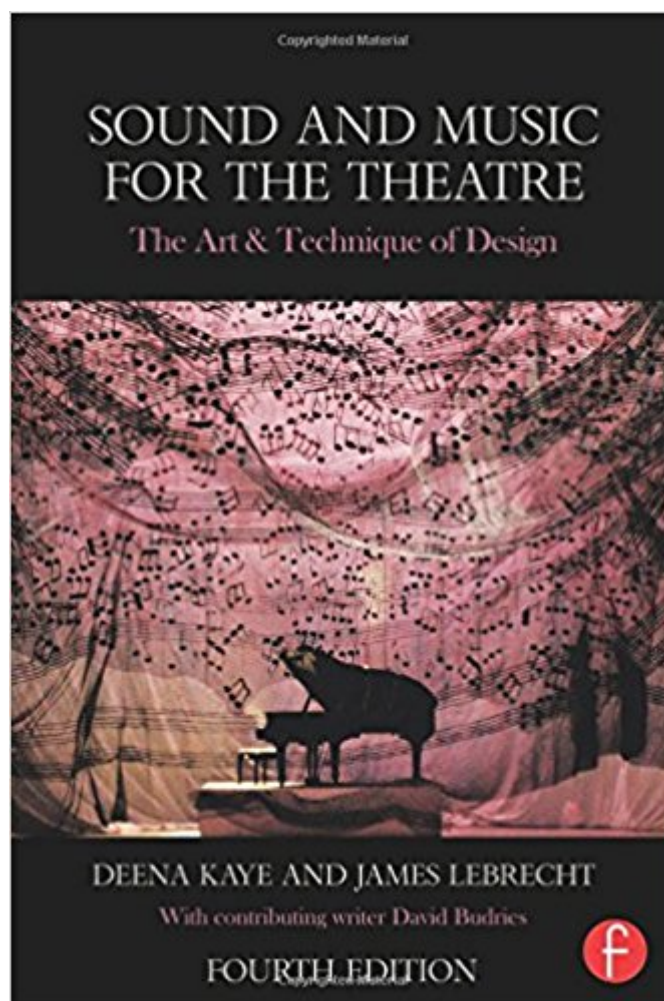

Sound And Music For The Theatre: The Art & Technique Of Design



Synopsis

Covering every phase of a theatrical production, this fourth edition of *Sound and Music for the Theatre* traces the process of sound design from initial concept through implementation in actual performances. The book discusses the early evolution of sound design and how it supports the play, from researching sources for music and effects, to negotiating a contract. It shows you how to organize the construction of the sound design elements, how the designer functions in a rehearsal, and how to set up and train an operator to run sound equipment. This instructive information is interspersed with *war stores*™ describing real-life problems with solutions that you can apply in your own work, whether you're a sound designer, composer, or sound operator.

It is an informative book, but the last TWO-THIRDS of the book is nothing but interviews!! All the valuable, insightful material takes place in the first 164 pages which is also sprinkled with real-world experiences by the authors. These real-world anecdotes are interesting to read, but most do not further the process along - they exist more like breaks in the action. After the first 150 pages it is a verbatim transcription of interviews with industry people. The last 212 pages could have been condensed into maybe 50 pages by extracting only the pertinent information. FYI: this is not 400 pages about the Art and Technique of Design; it is nearly 150 pages of info with a final 200 pages of rhetoric. I would not have paid this kind of money for what is a glorified primer.

A terrific book for Stage Managers to round out their awareness and insight into the sound designer and composers process as part of a theatrical collaborative team.

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
